Commissioners detail funding issues experienced by RTC Transportation

The Logan County Board of Commissioners (LCBOC) recently became aware that RTC Transportation Services would be reducing their scope of operations as of Jan. 17, 2025, and this week provided a detailed timeline regarding funding issues as reported by the organization.

"The Logan County Commissioners are extremely concerned about the loss of this valuable resource and are investigating options that will provide effective transportation to Logan County citizens," the commissioners said in a release.

July 18, 2024, the board of commissioners was made aware by representatives of RTC Services that RTC was experiencing financial losses due to reduced funding from the Ohio Department of Transportation.

"RTC indicated that they would need approximately \$350,000 to continue operations without cutting hours and services," the commissioners said in the release

"The LCBOC at that time reached out to many state government elected officials to ask for consideration to reinstate the previous level of funding provided by the Federal Department of Transportation (DOT) and the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT). It was hoped that with funding reinstated, RTC could recover from these losses and continue to provide services

as normal."

While state legislators were considering the situation, representatives from RTC once again visited the commissioners Aug. 15 with an update. RTC indicated that they had begun to cut services, but had not cut hours.

The commissioners suggested that RTC should reach out to the state officials themselves and "tell the story" of their need for funding. The LCBOC offered to make calls again and to host a meeting with representatives with RTC to help communicate the great need for this funding.

Then on Oct. 3, RTC Services provided another update to the commissioners, indicating that RTC was behind on their single audits as required by law and to receive funding from ODOT.

The audits for years 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023 had not been completed as required. The accountant for the 2021 audit had become unavailable, and RTC was looking for a new accountant to handle the audit process.

RTC representatives said they had requested audit extensions during this time of hiring a new accountant and ODOT was aware of the status of the audits.

The new accountant was set to begin audit year 2021 in November 2024, to be completed in the first quarter of 2025, and continue on with each audit until finished.

The RTC representatives indicated in this meeting for the first time that ODOT would not award a contract to RTC until all of the audits were completed and that the RTC contract for reimbursement from ODOT expires on Jan. 19, 2025.

In addition, the Logan County Board of Commissioners became aware that a \$1.3 million federal grant program to rehab the Logan County Transportation hub building and garage at 315 W. Auburn Ave. was being suspended by ODOT due to the financial audits not being completed by RTC Services as required by ODOT and the Federal Department of Transportation. ODOT stated it would not fund the project until the RTC audits were completed.

Dec. 10, the RTC Board of Directors visited the commissioners' office and stated that ODOT was not reimbursing RTC for services provided and that RTC could not continue to provide public transportation due to this lack of reimbursement. At that time, the stated end date was anticipated as the first week of February 2025.

In addition, the RTC Services Board members indicated that since ODOT would no longer be reimbursing RTC Services for expenses after Jan. 19, 2025, that they would be suspending operations on that date

Security risk assessment program to launch

Washington Township Police Chief Michael Thompson updated the Lakeview Village Council during its meeting Monday, Jan. 6, highlighting recent activity and future plans for community safety.

Since taking over patrols in Lakeview, Washington Township officers have conducted 27 business checks, made six traffic stops and issued five warnings along with one citation. Officers have also responded to various calls, including reports of a suspicious person, reckless

vehicle operation and an animal complaint.

Chief Thompson announced plans for a business security risk assessment program. This initiative will allow local businesses to have their security measures evaluated by officers, who will provide recommendations for improvement.

He also noted that two officers are scheduled to attend ALICE active shooter response training in March. Once completed, Washington Township Police will be equipped to train churches and other local organizations on how to respond to active shooter situations.



The police chief also noted the department's focus on learning the geography of Lakeview and keeping a visible presence within the community. Officers have prioritized building relationships with businesses and ensuring they feel supported and secure.

Bellefontaine and Benjamin Logan squared off in a Central Buckeye Conference girls basketball game Tuesday, with the Chieftains getting a 48-38 victory.

The game was close until the final minutes, with Ben Logan taking a lead in the second quarter and staying within a few points during the second half.

Bellefontaine overcame foul trouble for its starters and shooting issues, moving to 5-1 in the CBC and 8-4 overall.

The Lady Raiders fall to 0-7 in conference play and are now 1-11.

Quin Zedeker had 17 points to lead Bellefontaine's scoring. Hailee Lamb had 11 and Tiffany Boop put in 10.

"We've been struggling from the field these past couple games," said Bellefontaine coach Meghan Ashcraft. "Our percentages have been a little bit low. The girls are battling through that right now. We're trying to just keep them together as a team and get them to stay positive and work together."

She added that "what we do from here is what is going to make us who we are. Once they turned the defense up, then we started making those little buckets and getting turnovers we needed to pull the game out."

Ben Logan had three players with 10 points apiece, which pleased coach Greg Saylor, as well as the team's shot selection. They were sophomore Kylie Harner, freshman Daylin Varner and junior post player Adilynne Gregg. Harner missed last season due to injury.

"(Gregg) is learning how physical CBC play can be, especially a crossover game," said Saylor.
"Bellefontaine know us. We know (them). They're so well coached.
Really great people with really

great program. They came and we had a great game."

"It is a lot about winning the 'next'," he added. "Whatever the next thing is, win that. Whatever just happened is done and over with." He pointed to a sequence where Joplin Schneider missed a shot, then converted on her next chance. "They're really starting to embrace that and we are moving in the right direction."

The first eight minutes saw limited scoring on both ends. Ben Logan got a three-point play by Gregg to start the game, then did not score again until Lahna Cook hit a shot with a minute to go.

Bellefontaine connected on just three shots, one by Boop and two from Gabbe Hoon.

Zedeker scored twice in the opening minute of the second period, but the Raiders answered each. The first was a three by Varner and the other came from Gregg. Schneider got a putback with 6:20 to go to put the hosts ahead 12-10.

Boop hit from long distance for the Chieftains, with Harner's layup taking the lead back once more as it neared the midway point.

The back and forth continued. Bellefontaine got an end to end sprint and score by Lamb, then a 3ball from Zedeker. Ben Logan pulled back even with a steal and layup by Schneider and a layup from Varner.
