flown from C.R. 10 crash

Two motorists sustained serious injuries in a two-vehicle, head-on crash Monday evening, Jan. 20, and one of the drivers was flown to a Columbus hospital after the crash in the 1500 block of County Road 10 just outside the Bellefontaine city limits.

Troopers of the Marysville Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol report Chloe L. Gallagher, 20, of Bellefontaine, was first transported by squad to the Mary Rutan Hospital helipad after the crash, which occurred at 6:23 p.m. She was then flown by MedFlight helicopter to Grant Medical Center in Columbus.

The second driver, Sharon A. Schlabach, 58, of West Liberty, was transported by Tri-Valley EMS to Mary Rutan Hospital.

Troopers report Gallagher was operating a northwestbound 2003 Honda Accord on C.R. 10 near Township Road 179. Schlabach reportedly was operating a southeastbound 2019 Buick Encore on C.R. 10. A head-on crash between the two vehicles occurred and it is being investigated.

Alcohol is not suspected as a factor in the crash and both drivers were found to

Chieftains knock off North Union

The Chieftains came through in the clutch.

Bellefontaine got back in the win column Tuesday with a 64-57 home victory over North Union in Central Buckeye Conference boys basketball play.

Bellefontaine had the lead in the early going, with the Wildcats going in front by six at the half. After trading haymakers in a fastpaced third, the Chiefs got three big shots by sophomore Blake Loomis in the closing minutes to grab the lead for good.

The Chieftains go to 3-3 in conference play and are 8-6 overall. They are midway through a six-game stretch against league opponents.

Loomis had 10 points on the night, with eight of those coming at the end.

There was plenty of balance as Jair Mundy had 17, Grayson Lotts 13, and Braylon Newcomb 11, along with nine by Patrick Stolly.

North Union goes to 5-2 in the CBC and 7-7 overall. They were paced by the duo of Miles Hall with 21 points and Tyler Krebehenne with 19.

"Blake Loomis is a kid that's played JV most of the year," said Bellefontaine coach Henry Stolly. "And he came down and hit a couple of real big shots in the corner for us, and we're happy for him because nobody works any harder than he does."

"Both teams played hard. It's one of those games that would seem like it was going to go back and forth right down the stretch," noted Stolly. "Just an exciting game for the kids. Maybe not a clean game all the way around for us. We need to get better defensively going into Urbana Friday night, but we'll work that the next couple of days."

Bellefontaine plays the next four games on the road, and has just one more home game this season — Feb. 7 against Jonathan Alder

"We'll have to be road warriors," said Stolly. He said the remaining schedule includes

Scores by Nickolas Hajjar and Krebenne cut that lead down, then a free throw by Krebehenne tied it at 19 with five minutes to go.

Mundy got two shots to fall, then North Union answered with a three by Hajjar and a score by Kate

After a timeout, Mundy set up Lotts with a nice slant pass, and Lotts dropped it through.

North Union then closed the half on a 11-2 run to lead 33-27 as the teams headed to the locker rooms.

Newcomb, Lotts and Patrick Stolly hits shots for Bellefontaine in the third quarter. However, North Union answered each time — the first by Hall and the others by Krebehenne — keeping the lead.

After a three by Stolly, Mundy made a steal, and took it for a breakaway and dunk. The Wildcats leaned on Hall, but Bellefontaine stayed right on their heels with a pair of 3s by

Neither team was called for a foul in the entire period. That streak ended shortly into the fourth, as Krebehenne drew contact and hit both shots.

A trey by Lotts and another dunk from Mundy gave Bellefontaine the lead back with just over five minutes left.

Krebehenne made a baseline runner, but Mundy then made one of two at the foul line, tying the game at 52.

Hall drained one for the visitors. Then it was Loomis' time to shine. The first was a bank shot. The second was a three-pointer. The third was again from deep, coming after Newcomb made an outstanding play to save the ball from going out of bounds. That made it 60-54.

Krebehenne connected from long distance, but Bellefontaine kept the lid on from there, getting a basket by Mundy and two free throws by Stolly for the final margin of seven.

The junior varsity game had drama as well, with Bellefontaine winning 55-53 in overtime. Sutton Daring had 24 points, including a 3-pointer in the final seconds of overtime that proved the difference. Josh Phillips and Reign St. Clair each scored 11 points.

Bellefontaine (3-3, 8-6) is at Urbana on Friday. Next week, they travel to Shawnee Tuesday and Tecumseh on Jan. 31.
